Adding some PERSONALITY

Talk to your child about their ideal room, listen to their ideas about colour and style and come to a compromise.
 Start with a neutral palette such as white or pale grey and add pops of their favourite colour with bedding, storage and accessories. Grey and white work brilliantly with pink, red, navy or brighter shades like yellow or turquoise − and accents can be changed easily when their tastes move on. Colourful cube storage brightens up a bedroom and, if siblings share, each child can have different colour cubes in which to store their belongings.
 If your child really wants a themed bedroom, don't despair. Stick to accessories such as bedding or prints to add personality and colour. Great Little Trading Company sells 'roarsome' dinosaur bedding, wall art and accessories that won't overwhelm a room.
 A desk or play table provides space to think, make, build and create. Choose one with good storage or drawers to leave the surface clutter-free.

Happy storage

If you have a smaller space then modular furniture can be a good idea as it can make the most of corners and can incorporate built-in storage too. Beds

When it comes to choosing a children's bed, think functional and fun. Bunk beds are ideal for siblings but there are more design options with single beds such as different shapes and sizes. Tips on adding COLOUR

- If you want to ensure longevity of the scheme, avoid themes and aim for a neutral, calm base. A restrained colour palette will not compete with the riot of colour that children's possessions bring.
- Consider a tonal approach: painting woodwork and walls in the same or similar tones will make a room feel calmer and larger and offsets other colours beautifully.
- Add atmosphere and personality with decorative touches. They are easier to change as your children's tastes and interests evolve.
- Keep stimulating colours such as yellow and red for accents rather than walls and large pieces of furniture, as the room should enhance sleep. It makes future updates easier as well.
- Create focus by keeping pattern concentrated on one wall or on the bedding and cushions for example. Pictorial patterns tend to be age specific, so if you'd like items to last go for geometrical or classic patterns such as stars, stripes, checks, dots or florals.
- Curtains and blinds can be expensive, so go for plain neutrals rather than patterned fabrics, which will be easier to blend in during the next room refresh.
